Recent Achievements

Collaboration between international partners strengthens the effectiveness of their joint support to countries. As a model, CBRN CoE, the UNSCR1540 Secretariat and the Biological Weapons Convention Implementation Support Unit jointly organised a national CBRN awareness-raising event in Malawi. This revolved around the Malawi CBRN National Action Plan (December 2022).

In 2024, the Prime Minister of Tanzania formally adopted the CBRN National Action Plan (NAP). To attract the attention and interest of the decision-makers, the CBRN National Focal Point, with support form the CBRN CoE, organised a large port training and then field exercise, to showcase the challenges and capabilities in Tanzania. The CBRN NAP was launched during this event.

Hands-on training is key to building real operational readiness at border points. Under P99, countries engaged in scenario-based exercises to detect, investigate, and respond to the smuggling of high-risk biological agents. The project strengthened cross-border cooperation and frontline preparedness against the illicit movement of biological agents.
